Well, he was...until he decided to make a gift of it to raise money for Pioneer Valley Habitat. Through Habitat for Humanity International's Cars for Homes program, Anthony donated his 2004 Honda Element to be sold, a generous portion of the proceeds then coming to this local Habitat affiliate as unrestricted revenue.

Anthony is also in his element on the Habitat construction site. But that's another story.

It begins when he came to this country as a 7-year old émigré from England with his parents, and even at that young age he felt the improvement in his life due to his change of circumstances. That understanding of what a new life can offer someone, his desire to do something to give back to his community after the 2016 election, and a little encouragement from his (and Habitat's) friend Walt Kohler, brought him to Pioneer Valley Habitat's build in North Amherst in 2017.

A likely retirement activity for a former medical microbiologist? Sure! Anthony had two summers' experience as a carpenter's assistant as a teenager and his more recent work helping Valley Light Opera's set design team under his (work)belt. Equally compelling, he draws inspiration from Jimmy Carter who, like Anthony, served in the Navy

and who spends his retirement doing what Anthony describes as "meaningful volunteer work with a concrete outcome."

When thanked for all he has done for Habitat, Anthony says, "I have to argue with you about that. Habitat has given to ME. I have made good friendships with people from all walks of life, we're all there because we enjoy the hands-on stuff and giving back together." And, he adds, "I can put my hand on something and say, I did that."

Modular Homes Dedicated and Sold, Faith Community's Support

On a warm afternoon last fall, a crowd of more than 40 well-wishers gathered to dedicate two modular homes to their soon-to-be first-time homeowners. Speakers at the ceremony among them Northampton's mayor David Narkewicz, Alison Donovan of VEIC (the coordinator for the high performance modular program that helped fund these homes), Build Team member David Dunn and Jim Ayres of the Community Foundation of Western Mass shared what made this project experimental, innovative and a learning experience. The two homes represent Pioneer Valley Habitat's first foray into modular construction and a few weeks after the dedication were financed using creative mortgage packages provided by two local banks to the homebuyers.

Minister Michael McSherry of Edwards Church and Pastor Todd Weir of First Churches also spoke about the efforts of the interfaith community to bring these homes to completion. Congregations raised funds

totaling \$30,000 and contributed 1,000 volunteer hours on the construction site, at special events, as meal providers and in a number of other supportive roles.

Dear Habitat Community,

It was September of 2016 when the Community Foundation of Western Mass put out the call for "innovative" grant requests under the headline *Be Bold and Create Change*, and we began the journey of asking "What's big enough to house the dream of homeownership?" Pioneer Valley Habitat for Humanity has spent 30 years building

simple, energy efficient homes to bring strength and stability to the lives of people with low incomes – but how can we be a model in the region? Can we demonstrate innovative ways to bring small simple homes to the community?

Short answer – yes! We have finished our first few "Big Enough" pilot homes and are ready to share our lessons learned with the community.
