Making it Happen in the Habitat World: Businesses Step Up

We are so fortunate to live in a place with a lively local economy, a landscape dotted with small to medium sized businesses, many of them locally-owned or operated. Habitat construction is above all local. Neighbors helping neighbors to build and buy their first homes, homes that are deeded affordable in perpetuity to ensure families ready to become homeowners have opportunities to make their dream a reality. Construction in 2024 looks a lot different than it did 35 years ago when this affiliate first began building houses. Today, homebuilding Habitat-style requires increasingly more donations of cash and goods and services to help subsidize costs and keep home prices affordable.

The partnerships forged between Habitat and the businesses in our back yard are laying the groundwork for the front yards of future habitat homes. We salute some of the corporate contributions that have come our way in recent months and share some examples here in case they might inspire you and your place of business to consider a creative approach of your own to support the creation of affordable homeownership opportunities. Right here. Right now. In our Valley.

The employees of the Turners Falls Charter Next Generation Plant, recognizing that the housing crisis is continuing to be one of the most critical issues affecting the ability of local families/households on limited incomes to thrive and get ahead, sent a portion of this year's employee charitable contributions, several thousand dollars, to Pioneer Valley Habitat. "Keeping consistent with our Core Values of Caring and Committed to the communities our employees live in, our employees

requested that we donate to PVHH to ensure fellow community members have access to affordable housing, "said Chad Jzyk, Senior HR Business Partner at CNG.



Jim Flannery, owner of Peak Performance Roofing, also recognizing the immediacy of the need, jumped immediately when asked if he could provide a seasoned crew to roof two of the three houses currently under construction on Burts Pit Rd. In short order, Peak's roofers were at the site with their expert rooftop skills so the regular community volunteers could turn their attention to other tasks. When thanked for his efforts, Jim commented, "We were happy to be in a place where we were able to help Habitat for Humanity in its work to

build houses with those who need assistance with the purchase of a safe, affordable home.

Crews from engineering company DA Sullivan and Sons, solar installer PV2 and architectural fabricators Wright Millwork all rolled up sleeves and joined the work happening on the Victoria Bismark Farm construction site this fall. Cowls Building Supplies offers discounted materials to help mitigate construction costs, attorney Timothy Reilly does pro bono work for PVHH...the list goes on, too many to count. Whether providing general muscle, professional assistance or cash donations, members of our local business community are helping Habitat get the job done.
